

ENLIGHTENED: An overarching goal was to create a space that resonates with the Cathedral's specific temporal, physical, and cultural place. In consideration of the traditions of Bay Area architecture, the most elemental qualities of light, material and form were used to create sacred space within an ethos of sustainability.

The Cathedral employs state-of-the-art technologies to create lightness and space. A non-linear approach honors the church's 2,000-year history without forcing a specific point of view, remaining open to the region's ever-changing multi-cultural makeup. The sanctuary's foot-print of two interlocking circles forms the "vesica piscis,"–Latin for fish bladder–harkening back to the most primordial symbol of faith and responds to the site's close proximity to water.

The design draws on the tradition of light as a sacred phenomenon. Indirect daylight ennobles modest materials of wood, glass and concrete. Triangular aluminum panels form the petal-shaped screens over the entry and alter windows, the latter perforated with laser-cut holes. As points of light shine through the holes in varying levels of brightness, a 58-foot, 12th-century depiction of Christ appears.

The overall design invokes sanctuary in the broadest sense of the word.

LAB EXPERIMENT: The approach was slightly different as construction was well underway prior to identifying the tenants. To design a lab building without a specific user, the team applied their past experience, then adapted the design once occupants were selected. Interior spaces emphasize porosity across both vertical and horizontal planes while open stairways and doubleheight "living rooms" infuse the building with energy.



**CONNECTIVITY**: Between the building and the urban streetscape outside and within the building itself was key to this project. ABOVE THE CLOUDS: The challenge was to create an environment that reflects the trading firm's culture and highlights the owner's contemporary art collection while incorporating the city's best views of the San Francisco Bay. Located on the top floor of One Market Plaza, the design team created a "visually quiet" space to counter the constant visual stimulation of multiple computer screens. Conceived as a "white box" as the box's planes peel away, the materials, textures and colors behind are revealed. No solid walls touch the perimeter windows and service areas are located around the building's core, allowing clear views throughout the space of the entire city. Custom lounge chairs, office and workstations including a reception station designed by Zaha Hadid extends the art collection off the walls.

**NEWS WORTHY:** Distinguished as the signature dining experience at the Newseum, an interactive museum dedicated to the news, the design takes a challenging Washington DC site-a narrow sliver of building on three levelsand creates a metaphor for open expression. The design revels in transparency, from the dynamic stair and glass balustrade, frosted glass catwalk and wine wall, to fine-woven screens and expansive view windows. Wood-framed wire cloth screens provide a touch of privacy and are inspired by the leading and typesetting of traditional newspapers. Both the casual kitchen on the lounge level and the main kitchen on the upper level are visible from the street, highlighting the expression of transparency with a focus on the big story, Wolfgang Puck's cuisine.

This quote, which literally becomes a base to stand on, is integrated into the floor at this exhibit designed for IIDEX/NeoCon, Canada largest exposition for the design and construction industry. It highlights the exhibitor's ecological commitment and leadership regarding sustainability. Thoughout the exhibit, recycled and recyclable materials were used, as well as sustainable wood and wall finishes. The panels which form the primary wall treatment were made of recycled post industrial waste. The fully recyclable material is opaque, but the cut organic pattern provided translucency with allusions to nature.



**URBAN CONNECTION:** Integration of old and new elements and competing urban forces bring this remodeled warehouse alive. The rigidity of the original concrete structure is broken down in a subtle interplay of light, surfaces, levels and indoor/outdoor spacesmaking the living experience as richly textured as the city itself. The upper floors form the main living space for the owners and their child. Its focus is a new courtyard that connects the levels. This vertical section offers multiple layers of transparency, interweaving the inside and outside spaces. New dividers are treated as eight-foot-tall cabinetry, floating within the existing volume. Clear glass panes, a requirement of the owner, offer no visual privacy. Their connection to the outer world is a celebration of urban living.

**RIDGE RETREAT:** Overlooking the vineyards below, the home engages the external environment, making the visual layers outside an integral part of the interior. Choreographed views of ground, horizon and sky along with deliberate modulations of sun and shade are created by the scale and placement of glazing. PHOTOGRAPHER: David Wakley TEAM EMPOWERMENT: Employing an innovative multi-party Integrated Project Delivery approach, Autodesk's challenge was to create a world-class customer briefing center and office space within the historic One Market building. Building Information Modeling (BIM) was the cornerstone of the process, facilitating early design decision-making, a fast-track schedule and a LEED CI Platinum sustainable design goal.

LEED-CI Platinum was achieved by incorporating: bicycle parking and onsite shower facilities; water efficient fixtures; 49% of building materials were manufactured locally; 72% of all furniture purchased was salvaged, refurbished, or reused; Energy Star appliances; a signed two-year agreement to purchase 100% green power; 18% post-consumer and 20% pre-consumer recycled content in new building materials and products; low/no VOC paints adhesives and sealants; and daylight responsive lighting in all regularly occupied spaces.
